

TARBERT BRIDEWELL CLG PROJECT

What was the idea

Tarbert Bridewell, courthouse and jail, was built in 1831. It is an elegant, cut stone listed building. In 1987, the Bridewell Project Group was set up, it fundraised, purchased the building, renovated and restored it. Tarbert Bridewell Museum, coffee shop & gift shop opened for business in 1993. The roof was last refurbished approximately 30 years ago and was in need of repair, the felt had perished, allowing water to saturate the structure. Preserving the fabric of the building would ensure that the Bridewell can continue to be used regularly, into the future.

Challenges

Once the application to the EIRGRID Community Sponsorship Fund was successful the group set about engaging their preferred contractor however as they had ceased trading, and Covid-19 restrictions were in now place the group secured a new contractor who was at the time carrying out other works at the Bridewell thus making his quote competitive.
